The interest and donations this past year resulted in the following balances for each fund at year end: Ken Eskelund Preceptorship \$103,448; Reed Rumsey Student Award \$60,500; Lasher-Bottorff \$91,856; Bayer-Snoeyenbos New Investigator Award \$58,782; Richard B. Rimler Award \$40,582; L. Dwight Schwartz Scholarship \$70,532; Calnek Applied Poultry Research \$57,196; and the A. S. Rosenwald fund \$7,351. The AAAP Foundation Student Scholarship continued to grow rapidly as members making long term pledges fulfilled their commitments to bring it to \$50,039 this past year. There were thirteen applicants for the scholarship in FY2014/2015 and seven \$1000 scholarships were awarded for a total of \$7,000.

The AAAP Foundation Board, led by President Fred Hoerr, has been very successful in creating new scholarships and growing the Foundation's assets. Three new scholarships were created this past fiscal year (2014/2015) as part of the Poultry Scholarship program: The AAAP Past Presidents' Scholarship (\$49,700), The Roland Winterfield Scholarship (\$7,500) and the MAM Jack Tumblin Scholarship (\$12,150) totaling \$69,400. I want to highlight in this Annual Report the generosity of Dr. Bill Chase who fully endowed the Past Presidents' Scholarship with his gift of \$40,000.

The Foundation made donations of three Histopathology manuals, three Practical Guides to Biosecurity, three Avian Pathology manuals, three Isolation and Identification manuals, and one Disease of Poultry to Bangladesh, India. Also, the Foundation donated to the National Veterinary Institute in Debre Zeit, Ethiopia; four Avian Disease manuals, four Isolation and Identification manuals and two Diseases of Poultry. To Punjob, Pakistan; one Avian Disease manual and one Diseases of Poultry. AAAP also participates in the BioOne Developing World Program where the Journal *Avian Diseases* is provided in leading developing world initiatives collectively known as Research 4 Life and EIFL and TEEAL. Through this initiative AAAP and BioOne provides *Avian Disease* free of charge to over 2,500 institutions throughout the developing world.
